This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Each week, every class of pupils have a one-hour music lesson, taught by Class Teachers who are supported by Mrs Mitchell.

Our music curriculum is informed by the Model Music Curriculum (MMC) following the Charanga music scheme of work:

Throughout the year, pupils have opportunities to learn to sing and play an instrument during lesson time through whole-class ensemble teaching in all year groups.

Our music curriculum is strengthened by having Mrs Mitchell teach the model music curriculum in Years 3 and 5, supporting Class Teachers in the delivery of the curriculum and by integrating upgraded technology (new headphones, ipads and Chrome books) which is used to enhance the curriculum. In addition Year 3 learn to play the recorder.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

- All pupils have opportunities to sing in choral assembly led by Mrs Mitchell every Tuesday morning.
- There is a school band which practises and performs every Tuesday morning at 8:15am with Mrs Mitchell.
- Thingwall Primary also facilitate Rock Steady, an external music company, who attend school weekly, every Tuesday afternoon. Lessons offered by the company include singing, keyboard, piano, guitar, bass guitar and drums. These lessons are paid for by parents and can be taught in small groups. As part of our Pupil Premium Strategy, pupils in receipt of pupil premium funding have the opportunity to have music lessons with Rock Steady. At the end of every term, pupils who have attended these lessons perform in front of the rest of the school and parents as part of a Rock Steady concert. https://www.rocksteadymusicschool.com/info-for-parents/

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts. In EYFS, pupils sing rhymes daily and have access to musical instruments as part of their daily indoor and outdoor continuous provision.

All Year groups from FS2 – Y6 at Thingwall Primary perform in front of the whole school and parents by singing / playing instruments during their annual class assembly.

There is an annual Year 6 Christmas Carol performance at the Warrens Medical Centre in Arrowe Park and at Trepassey Residential Home, Heswall. Year 6 produce a leavers performance during the summer term. This includes singing a variety of songs and opportunities for solo, small group and ensemble performances.

The whole school attends, led by Key Stage 2, a Christmas Carol concert at St Michaels and all Angels Church, Pensby every year, with opportunities for the school choir and school band to perform in front of parents and pupils.

Key Stage 1 perform a nativity for the whole school and wider audience (e.g. family, Trepassey Residential Home)

The School Band and Choir lead Harvest and Easter Festivals in School and the wider community.
