What is Refugee Week?

Refugee Week is a UK programme of arts, cultural and educational events and activities that celebrate the contribution of refugees to the UK. It aims to help people understand why others have to become refugees. Refugee Week usually takes place in June. Anyone can be involved by either organising, attending or taking part in activities.

What does being a refugee mean?

A refugee is someone who has had to leave their own country because they are being treated badly or are in fear of being treated badly. Sometimes, people can be afraid of being hurt, or even killed, because of their religious beliefs or because of where they are from. People are often forced to become a refugee because of war, bad leadership in a country or natural disasters.



Did you know?

A natural disaster is a volcano, flood, drought, terrible storm or widespread illness.

When did Refugee Week begin?

Refugee Week began in 1998 because there was a lot of incorrect information about why refugees came to the UK. Many newspapers reported that refugees were here for money and 'free housing', and there were a lot of bad feelings towards refugees.

Own response - A refugee is a person who has had to leave their own country because they are in fear of their life. They are frightened that they might be killed because of their beliefs, race or religion, or because they are victims of a natural disaster.

2. Why might someone find they need to be a refugee?

Someone might become a refugee because there is a war, leadership of the country is bad or because they are victims of a natural disaster.

3. Explain what 'negative attitudes' means in the text.

Negative attitudes refer to the wrong judgements that people made about refugees. They did not know them or understand them so they may have been unkind.

4. What positive things might a refugee bring to the country?

Refugees might bring new languages, new foods, interesting traditions, skills and talents to the country.

5. What did newspapers tell people about refugees? Why is it that a problem?

The newspapers reported that refugees only came to the UK for the financial benefits and free housing. This made people think badly of refugees and not want to help them.

Own response - A refugee is a person who has had to leave their own country because they are in fear of their life. They are frightened that they might be killed because of their beliefs, race or religion, or because they are victims of a natural disaster.

Refugee Week was started because there was a lot of negativity about refugees and people in the UK thought they were just coming here for the financial benefits and housing.

3. Explain what 'sanctuary' means.

Sanctuary means a safe place or refuge.

4. What word tells us that people already living in the UK did not show refugees much understanding?

The word 'ignorance' tells us that people living in the UK did not show refugees much understanding.

The organisers want to 'create better understanding between different communities and to encourage successful integration'.

Refugees could introduce people in the UK to different foods, a different language, artistic or design ideas and skills. They can teach us about the traditions in their country and different religious beliefs.

A refugee might feel frightened, confused, scared, unwelcome or homesick when getting to a different country. Own responses also accepted.

Children need to learn about refugees because they will make decisions about important issues like refugees in the future, when they are grown up. They need to have a good understanding of refugees for everyone to live together in harmony.
